As the President of the HFUU Haleakala Chapter, I got sober about what it means to live in one of the most remote island chains in the world. My sobriety manifests in making a commitment in support of our island's quest for food security, healthier soils, and in service to a community of healthier minds, bodies, and spirits. I now know this quest can be best realized in support of local small farmers.

When I first moved to Kihei 10 years ago from Massachusetts (where I had a large organic garden), I wanted to learn about tropical agriculture. I joined a group forming called [South Maui Sustainability](#) (SMS) and became a core group member. At SMS I met people who were interested in fostering food security through teaching people how to grow their own food, supporting school and community gardens, water conservation, and protection of our fragile reef systems. During that same time, I also joined the Maui Tomorrow Food Security Committee. This was when the need for a local food movement struck me hard when I learned that we import over 80% of our food and, if the barges stopped, we had 6 days of food stored. Yikes!

Professional Profile: From 2002-2007, as a member of the Maui County Board of Water Supply and in my last year serving as Board Chair, I came face to face with farmers and ranchers worried about drought and its impact on their livelihoods. I also learned about the impact of feral ungulates, Axis deer, wild pigs, and goats threatening our watersheds. I met hunters interested in a venison industry and became immersed in the quest to rescue farmers and ranchers from inundation by these pests by proposing to the County that we form a cooperative of Axis deer harvesters. The Maui Axis Deer Harvesting Cooperative was born.

My avocation is that of an educator. I hold a doctorate in adult education and one of my central interests in being an HFUU Board member is to help create the curriculum for our On-Farm Mentoring initiative. As a team member at UH-Maui College Office of Continuing Education & Training, [SLIM](#), and [EdVenture](#), my paid work takes me into job creation in sustainable agriculture! a perfect marriage of my paid work and volunteerism. How lucky can one woman be?

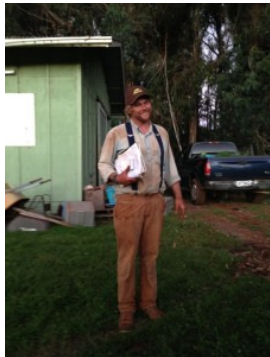


Bill Greenleaf - Director

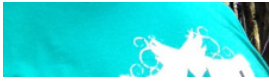
